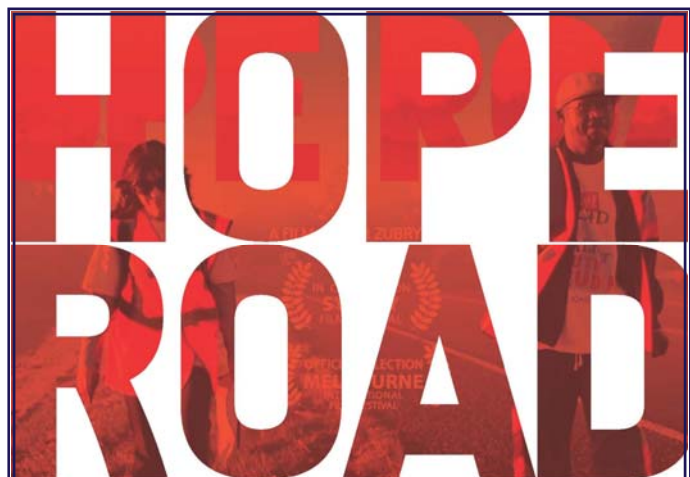


Albert Einstein said "Logic will get you from A to B, but creativity will take you anywhere". It is with this in mind that I have been talking to students who are interested in choosing

Visual Arts as an elective, either for Stage 5 or 6. The skills developed in Visual Arts are transferable throughout life and focus on the process of harnessing the imagination to think broadly, analyse and problem solve from different points of view in order to arrive at novel solutions. The range of careers that directly employ the Visual Artists is much wider than most people think, from Artist through Interior Design to Webpage Design. ### General Examination Procedures:

1. No mobile devices should be brought into the examination room, any water bottles should be clear plastic containers, all required equipment should be brought in with student.
2. Students are expected to assemble outside the exam area at least 5 minutes prior to the commencement of the exam, if they have not already been studying in the allocated room.
3. No materials other than specified for the exam will be taken into the exam room. All bags are to be placed outside the room.
4. Students will take direction from the exam supervisors without discussion.
5. All exams will be attempted with honesty and integrity. Any student who attempts to cheat, deface the exam paper or offer a non serious attempt will have an SBC referral made, with the likely outcome being zero recorded for the exam.
6. No student will communicate with another student in the exam rooms for any reason. They may raise their hand and patiently wait for the supervisor to attend to their needs. Borrowing equipment will not be permitted during exams.
7. All students will present themselves for exams in the correct College uniform.
8. Any student who arrives 15 minutes late for an exam will not normally be permitted to enter.
9. No student will be permitted to leave any examination before the time designated for completion.
10. Students will not be permitted to leave the examination room until:

- a. Responses have been collected.
  - b. Rubbish has been disposed of via the bin.
  - c. Examination furniture has been inspected by the supervisor.
  - d. The Examination Supervisors are satisfied that all is in order.
11. Study Periods during examinations
    - a. Rooms will be designated for study during periods in which a student is not undertaking an examination.
    - b. All students are expected to have materials with them that they require for study
    - c. Normal expectations of examination rooms apply to study rooms
    - d. Desks should remain separated as in exam rooms
    - e. The supervisor may allow students to have a break from the room at the conclusion of a normal period.
  12. Toilet Breaks—Students who wish to use the toilets during examinations will need to raise their hand and wait for a supervisor. The supervisor will collect all examination papers belonging to the student. Supervisors will make a notation on the written papers indicating that the student left the exam (time to be notated) and once again when the student returns and collects his examination from the supervisor.
  13. Senior students (Year 11 and 12) leaving the College after an exam will follow the normal sign-out procedures.

# JUNIOR JUDGING

**WHEN:** 10am -12pm, Saturday 11th August 2018

**WHERE:** Sheep Pavilion, Bathurst Showground.

**WHAT:** Key talking point for the 2018 BMA Junior Judging is :

*"To promote educate and encourage the sustainable, ecological and ethical production of tomorrows super fibre today"*

Come and hear from commercial wool growers speak on the techniques they have employed to keep their businesses afloat in challenging economic times.

The day is divided into two sessions:

- 1) Merino Industry Skills 10am to 11am:** Listen, learn, and then practice the basics of selecting profitable sheep.
- 2) Junior Judging 11am to 12pm:** Put the skills you have learnt into practice and speak about your choice under the guidance of Senior Judge Dan Rayner.

**WHO:** The competition is open to ages 6 to 17 years and serves as an introduction to the wool industry and a basis for larger competitions such as the Dubbo Ram Sale Junior Judging.

In January of 2019 we are hoping to once again get a wether trial up and running.

The thinking so far from the committee is;

- 2018 drop ORANGE taggers
- 15 wether per a team
- BMA will purchase them \$20 per a head
- They will be shorne on arrive to even them all up to the one length and any wethers with good length wool will go back to the owner.
- Then the wethers will be held as a group for one year to let them grow up and the trial will start in 2020.
- The trial will run for 3 shearing's
- Whether will be sold over the hook at the end of the 3 shearing's.

Pricking out your team;

- 20 wether are to be drafted off the mob at random.
- The owner has the right to remove 5 wethers to make the team of 15.
- You need them to be drafted by a independent person.
- Committee members are available to draft. (Ask Kirby who they are if needed.)
- If you are going to sell you wethers off early please advise us and we can draft off your team ready before they are sold.

What will you get out of the trial;

- Knowledge on how your sheep perform against other sire lines, wool types and general performance across the board.
- The value of your wethers will be paid back to you once they are sold minus the \$20 purchase price.
